### **Whooping Crane Stopover Habitat Project**

MBAS Vice-President Chester McConnell is also President of Friends of the Wild Whoopers (FOTWW). FOTWW focuses on developing, protecting and managing habitat for the only wild Whooping Crane population on earth. That population nests in Wood Buffalo National Park, Canada, migrates 2,500 miles through the middle of the US and winters on Aransas National Wildlife Refuge on the Texas coast.

During these migrations the Whoopers stopover in ponds and streams about 10 to 15 times, and remain for a day or two to rest and feed. Regrettably, many "stopover habitats" are being destroyed or degraded on private property due to a variety of intensified developments. FOTWW has been working with U.S. military bases and Indian Reservations to develop and protect stopover habitats, which are as essential to the Whooping Cranes as are their Canadian nesting sites and Aransas Refuge wintering habitats on the Texas coast.

## Whooping Crane Stopover Habitat Project, continued from front page

The bases and reservations within the Whoopers' flyway corridor have over 4 million acres of land, and some have been developed and managed as stopover areas. FOTWW has been successful in applying its management knowledge on this land, which has resulted in a win-win for wild Whooping Cranes, the U.S. military, Indian Reservations and FOTWW.

Chester McConnell and reservation biologists identified over 1,700 potential stopover ponds/wetlands on Indian reservations in North Dakota and South Dakota and 150 on military bases within the Whooping Crane migration corridor. The biologists estimated that 75 percent of the ponds could provide good stopover habitat. During the surveys FOTWW biologist Chester McConnell instructs reservation biologists on habitat management practices necessary to make ponds/wetlands acceptable to Whooping Cranes.
